Mapping the Medieval City 30-31 July, Swansea University

Delegates are invited to register for the Mapping the Medieval City international interdisciplinary colloquium to be held at Swansea University on 30-31 July.

The colloquium will be held on Swansea's Singleton campus, a mile outside the city centre and right on the seafront. Swansea is easily accessible by road and rail – see <http://www.swansea.ac.uk/alumniandvisitors/HowtoGetHere/> for suggested routes. As you will see, delegates have the choice between two packages. Package 1, priced at £85, includes one night's bed and breakfast accommodation in an en-suite room on Swansea's scenic seafront campus and everything in Package 2; Package 2, priced at £35, is the non-residential option, but includes afternoon tea and a drinks reception on July 30 and morning coffee and lunch on July 31. Delegates opting for Package 2 will need to make their own arrangements for accommodation; a list of local bed and breakfasts and hotels is available at www.visitswanseabay.com. We are grateful to the Arts and Humanities Research Council and the School of Arts, Swansea University for grants which have enabled us to keep the conference fees so low.

Swansea is on the edge of the Gower Peninsula, Britain's first Area of Outstanding Natural Beauty, and the region has a wealth of medieval heritage including castles such as Oystermouth, Weobley, Kidwelly and Carreg Cennen. Delegates may want to make their own arrangements to stay on and explore the area after the colloquium.
